

GAMMA-RHO DODGES BALLS, NOT ISSUES

Kappa Sigma Fraternity raised more than \$2,800 for the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation in their second annual dodgeball tournament yesterday, choosing the organization because one of their members has the disease, according to event officials.

More than 200 students and nearly 100 spectators met yesterday morning at the north gym of the Student Recreation Center for the friendly competition and pizza.

"(The teams) were intense, yelling and screaming; whistles were blowing and everyone was having fun," said Matt Mayberry, economics junior, vice president of

Kappa Sigma, and coach of Delta Delta's firstplace team.

"Not only are we able to give them \$2,800 from another non-profit organization, but it helps give publicity about the disease," Mayberry said.

Matt Bott, assistant executive director for the national Kappa Sigma organization, said he urges chapters to choose creative service projects that members are passionate about.



Andrew Rozen, an animal sciences sophomore and event organizer, said his fraternity holds annual fundraisers because they want to give back to the community.

Rozen, philanthropy chair for Kappa Sigma, said the event was partially influenced by Rawson Marshall Thurber's movie "Dodgeball: A True Underdog Story," but that this year's event was also motivated by last year's success.

Rozen also said a member of Kappa Sigma has cystic fibrosis, although the member could not be reached for comment.

Matt Mayberry also said of the event, "(The teams) were intense, yelling and screaming, whistles

were blowing, and everyone was having fun."

Fraternity members have volunteered 116 hours at local non-profits and plan to increase the number of volunteer hours throughout the semester, Rozen said.

Volunteer activities include playing with children in the University Medical Center pediatrics department; building arts and crafts; and raising money for Hurricane Katrina victims. The fraternity will hold a blood drive after spring break.

Of the five hundred men to walk through our doors during fall rush, 52 were pledged and 42 were initiated. This spring we also had a successful rush and took ten outstanding gentlemen. With help from our alumni, the pledge education process has gone very well and we are proud of our most recent initiates. Two of these men, Brian Naggy '06 and Kyle Simmons '06, currently serve on the executive committee and are excited to help lead our house.

One of our most accomplished projects of this year has been the renovation of the chapter room and the focus on respect for the ritual. The chapter room now features our charter, composites, memorabilia, awards, and pictures that line the walls of the room. This project, spearheaded by our GMC, Matt Mayberry '05, has increased chapter attendance and chapter organization. We invite all our alumni to attend formal chapter and enjoy these changes for themselves.

Another accomplishment was our second annual dodge ball philanthropy. Gamma-Rho raised almost three thousand dollars for the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. As some of you may already know, a member in the fraternity has cystic fibrosis and has been appreciative the last two years of our cause and help. It was heavily publicized in the *Arizona Daily Wildcat* and received a fair amount of accolades from Headquarters. We are excited to continue the growing tradition.

To conclude, a few unique things have happened to our chapter and Greek Life on campus that are worth mentioning. Gamma-Rho has been on alcohol probation for the majority of the year due to an underage drinking incident that occurred in the fall semester. We have been very compliant, learned a myriad of lessons, and are excited that we were able to manage change without long-term effects on our chapter – membership, rush, excessive regulations, etc. It is also very encouraging to know that Gamma-Rho does not use social events and alcohol as the glue by which our brotherhood and friendships have been held. Although the "parties" have been non-existent, our members' resolve and unification has still been noteworthy. This alone has made me very proud to preside over such a great group of gentlemen.

Possibly the greatest change to affect our chapter has been the byproduct of changes in Greek Life. For the first time since their creation

Nationally, Kappa Sigma's more than 200 chapters donated about 170,000 hours of service and

\$724,000 to various charities, said Patrick Corr, deputy commissioner of national service effort for Kappa Sigma's "A Greater Cause Commission."

Bott said the fraternity encourages chapters to do service projects in their local community as it "is such an important part of what we do."

Rozen said the chapter plans to continue the dodgeball tournament in the future as part of the fraternity's service projects.

"This year, we will have all the kinks out," he said. "Hopefully, we will make this an annual tournament."

INSPIRING MINDS (From Entrepreneur Magazine, October 2006)

The diverse backgrounds of the students are what make today's entrepreneurship education a truly interdisciplinary adventure. Sure, traditional business students leap into entrepreneurship and take business classes—but so do students in liberal arts, technology, and the sciences.

Alex Farkas, who double-majored in art history and entrepreneurship, was still an undergraduate at the University of Arizona when he launched his Phoenix business with fellow students Stephen Tanenbaum '02 and Greg Rosborough. The 23-year-old co-founders of Ugallery.com believed young artists were clamoring for a place to show and sell their original artwork, and that consumers would gladly trade in their mass-produced art posters for one-of-akind creations. The idea originated as a class project but materialized into a successful online emporium that sells the work of student artists.

The collaboration, in-class discussions, and mentorship they experienced within the entrepreneurship program helped Farkas and his partners clearly articulate their business plan—which won them more than \$22,000 in start-up capital at a couple of business plan competitions. Still in the start-up stage (the website officially launched in September), Ugallery.com aims to reach \$250,000 in sales in its first fiscal year.

Conducting focus groups and giving questionnaires to people in their target market were just some of the assignments Farkas, Tanenbaum, and Rosborough had to complete for their classes. "The practical aspect of the entrepreneurship department is that [it] gives you the basic framework [for a business plan]," says Farkas. "But the beautiful part is they really make you go out and figure it out." **GAMMA-RHO**
