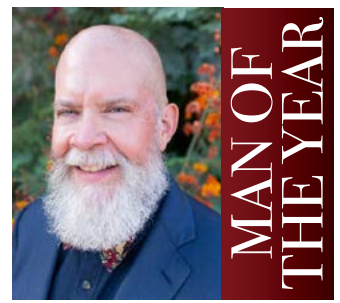

We have finished our second full year back in the chapter house. We saw many successes this past year, as well as a few struggles, which is to be expected as we rapidly restore our prestige on campus. The main thing is that we stay focused on our vision and the long-term success of our chapter. We started

the fall with a great recruiting cycle, initiating 40 men in the fall semester and 17 in the spring—each of them hardworking and driven individuals. Over the past year, we have elevated ourselves to a position where we consistently compete for top recruits and have had great success bringing those men into our chapter. Despite this success, we have maintained our vision of slow and steady growth.

This year was a success in terms of members stepping up. As we continue to grow and remain a dominant force in the Greek community, it is crucial that members rise to the occasion. The chapter demonstrated its dedication by achieving 100% participation in SAJ Weekend again this year. We also ended the year with a chapter average of 40 community service hours per man. Our members' dedication to the community sets us apart from other organizations in the Greek system. Academically, the Gamma-Rho Chapter finished second in the IFC for GPA, with an impressive 3.38 chapter average. For the second year in a row, we earned both the Most Outstanding IFC Chapter Award and the national FACE Award. This award is not easily earned, as evidenced by it being only the third FACE Award in our chapter's history. This past week at Grand Conclave, we were also honored with the Academic Excellence Award and the Silver Bowl Award. Lastly, all five of our EC members won the Outstanding Undergraduate Award for their respective positions—further testament to the dedication and excellence of our Undergraduates.

As we enter our third year in the house, we continue our mission of pursuing perfection. We are now at a point where maintaining excellence has become our focus. The goal for the final semester of my presidency—and for the presidents who follow—is to preserve the success we've built over the past two years. I believe that, with the members we currently have and the future members we will select, we can maintain this success for many years to come. Like any organization, we face our share of road bumps, but how we respond is the key to our long-term success. I can say with confidence that the men of Gamma-Rho always chase perfection—and that the road bumps only make us stronger.

Remembering EL CAPITAN COURT

Many of you have heard me say more than once “no Matt Noble, no Gamma-Rho.” That may or may not be true, it is possible that someone else might have stepped up and rekindled the fire after the two times the chapter has gone dark in this millennium / century. However that is far from a certainty. I think of Matt as the Golden Hearted Tucsonan in much the same way that the International Fraternity calls Stephen Alonzo Jackson the Golden Hearted Virginian. Jackson’s legacy was keeping Kappa Sigma alive and in originating a spirit of expansion, in addition to essentially writing our ritual. Matt’s legacy thus far has been leading us through and out of not just two, but three major crises over the last 40 years.

Prior to Gamma-Rho’s two departures from the UA campus in the 2000’s, the chapter faced two other, similar crises. Going dark in the early 70’s was answered in the late 70’s with leadership from Charles Sullivan, another alum to whom Gamma-Rho likely owes its existence. The second came in the late 80’s following the shooting and tragic death of officer Kevin Barleycorn at the house on North Cherry Avenue. Matt Noble, AA at the time and a relatively young alum, led the charge to get the chapter rehoused, enlisting the generosity of Mike Cagalj, Gary Foster, Don Harris, and Tom Keating, to come together to purchase El Capitan Court on North Park Avenue and to lease it to the chapter. This undoubtedly kept the chapter together and functioning, but more than that inspired alumni to raise the money to build the current house and provided a fantastic transition for the chapter to a whole new identity on Greek row. El Capitan Court and our time there was key to our survival and to our identity.

Pages, perhaps books, could be written about the five years Gamma-Rho spent at El Capitan, and some of that might even be family-friendly. The brothers from that era are both uniquely and deeply connected. The bottom line, though, is that while the chapter’s identity was distinct then, as it was at the Cherry house and every other facility prior to that, and as it is now in the First Street house, the Gamma-Rho thread that ties every generation together was equally strong. Regardless of your era, the tie that binds us is strengthened by the fact that every brother has both a shared identity with all Kappa Sigma’s and particularly Gamma-Rho’s, but also has had an experience that is unique to them and those from their era.

With the school year behind us, I'm happy to report that the undergraduates left the house in excellent condition. None of the brothers lost their full security deposit, and several received full refunds. Those of you who are landlords know—that's no small feat! This July, we have four undergraduates living in the house while completing their EMT certifications. We're also exploring additional summer occupancy options in the future to further utilize the property.

On the facilities front, we recently upgraded concrete surfaces with a polyurea/polyaspartic coating—four times stronger than traditional epoxy. It looks fantastic and should last for many years. We also installed a high-pressure misting system to enhance the rear patio during the hot months. This upgrade was initiated by the undergraduates, who are proudly covering half the cost. Additionally, the renovation of our front patio monument area is now complete. We invite you to stop by and see the improvements for yourself. Once again, the house will be at full capacity this fall, filled with our high-performing "House Corp Green" brothers—half of whom are upperclassmen. Demand to live in the house remains strong, and some brothers even wait a year to secure a spot. We are fulfilling our commitment to provide the best living environment possible, and our undergraduate brothers continue to live up to their promise of being a chapter we can all be proud of.

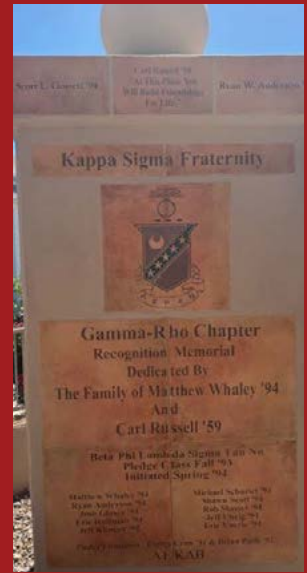
The House Corporation is very pleased with our tenants—and we know you will be too.
